

READ: The Origins of Black History Month

The story of Black History Month begins in 1915, half a century after the Thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. That September, the Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH), an organization dedicated to researching and promoting active ments HISTORY by Black Americans and other peoples of African descent.

How an Enslaved African Man in Boston Helped Save Generations from Smallpox During the Smallpox epidemic of 1721, an enslaved man known only as Onesimus suggested "once the infected material was introduced into the body, the person who underwent the procedure was inoculated against smallpox. It wasn't a vaccination, which involves exposure to a less dangerous virus to provoke immunity, but it did activate the recipient's immune response and protected against the disease most of the time," (Blakemore, 2021).
