

ON-CAMPUS VACCINATION RATES (ALL NCCC CAMPUSES)

A total of **456 of 457 on-campus students are fully vaccinated**. One unvaccinated student has been granted medical accommodations. The remaining student population is fully online. More than 90 percent of full-time faculty and staff are vaccinated.
