Emergency Funding Available for Eligible Students



Need help paying for basic needs due to the COVID-19 crisis? The college may be able to help.

If you are experiencing a one-time financial emergency that might prevent you from completing your education, you can <u>submit an</u> <u>application for Student Emergency Funding</u>.

There are three different funding sources available to students, some of which may require repayment. Eligibility will be determined after an application is submitted and may vary based upon the funding source. You may be asked to produce documents that demonstrate an emergency and a need for these funds.

Examples of eligible expenses include utilities, housing/rent, food, medical and child care expenses. For more information, and an application link, <u>visit our website</u>.

Darren Bonaparte, director of the tribe's Historic Preservation Office, will present "**Tribal History Part One: The Early History of Akwesasne.**" This program will focus on the new indigenous community established on the St. Lawrence River at the dawn of the Seven Years War and explore its history through the American Revolution and the War of 1812.
